

## Dealing with disasters assembly

### Introduction

July 2011. 12 million people in East Africa are facing desperate food shortages following the worst drought in 60 years.

Rains have failed for successive seasons, and families across Somalia, Ethiopia and Kenya are struggling to find anything to eat or drink. Hundreds of thousands of livestock have already died. Food prices have rocketed.

Explore how governments, charities and individuals deal with disasters like this Food Crisis, and think about what action we can take to make a difference to the situation.

## **About this resource**

This resource is designed to be delivered as an assembly and consists of a powerpoint presentation and accompanying script.

It provides a general introduction to what we mean by 'disaster', what makes poor people particularly vulnerable to disasters and how the international community responds to disasters. Campaigning and fundraising are suggested as appropriate actions for young people who wish to get involved in reducing the impact of present and future disasters.
